Background

The importance of infrastructure* to heritage science is now recognised across the research and innovation ecosystem. Significant investments have already been made in EU-funded infrastructure (such as IPERION and E-RIHS) and more investment in UK infrastructure is planned by AHRC (subject to business case approval). As this new investment is being planned, what can we learn from history? Experience suggests that both providers and potential users of heritage science infrastructure face a range of practical issues, which present variously as opportunities and challenges. For example, heritage science infrastructure is currently unevenly distributed both geographically (including across the UK and internationally) and across multiple communities of practice (such as conservators and materials scientists).

About this event

The event is intended to bring together ideas and opinions across the Heritage Science sector and to allow the NHSF to listen to its members and stakeholders. The outcomes from the day's discussions will help enable collaboration and operational planning for an enhanced UK heritage science research and innovation infrastructure. Participants will gain an up-to-date picture of the development of the proposed RICHeS (Research Infrastructure for Conservation and Heritage Science) programme as well as a range of practical insights from infrastructure coordinators, providers and users based on experience to date. There will be frequent opportunities for discussion and engagement with speakers and other attendees, and a breakout session in the afternoon will enable participants to reflect on the plans for RICHeS, the benefits they anticipate and any issues that they feel should be addressed as they reflect on the infrastructure needs of the future. The Forum is particularly interested in participants' views on the development of networks, methods of engaging potential users and impact methodologies necessary for a successful access programme.
